

The Trails

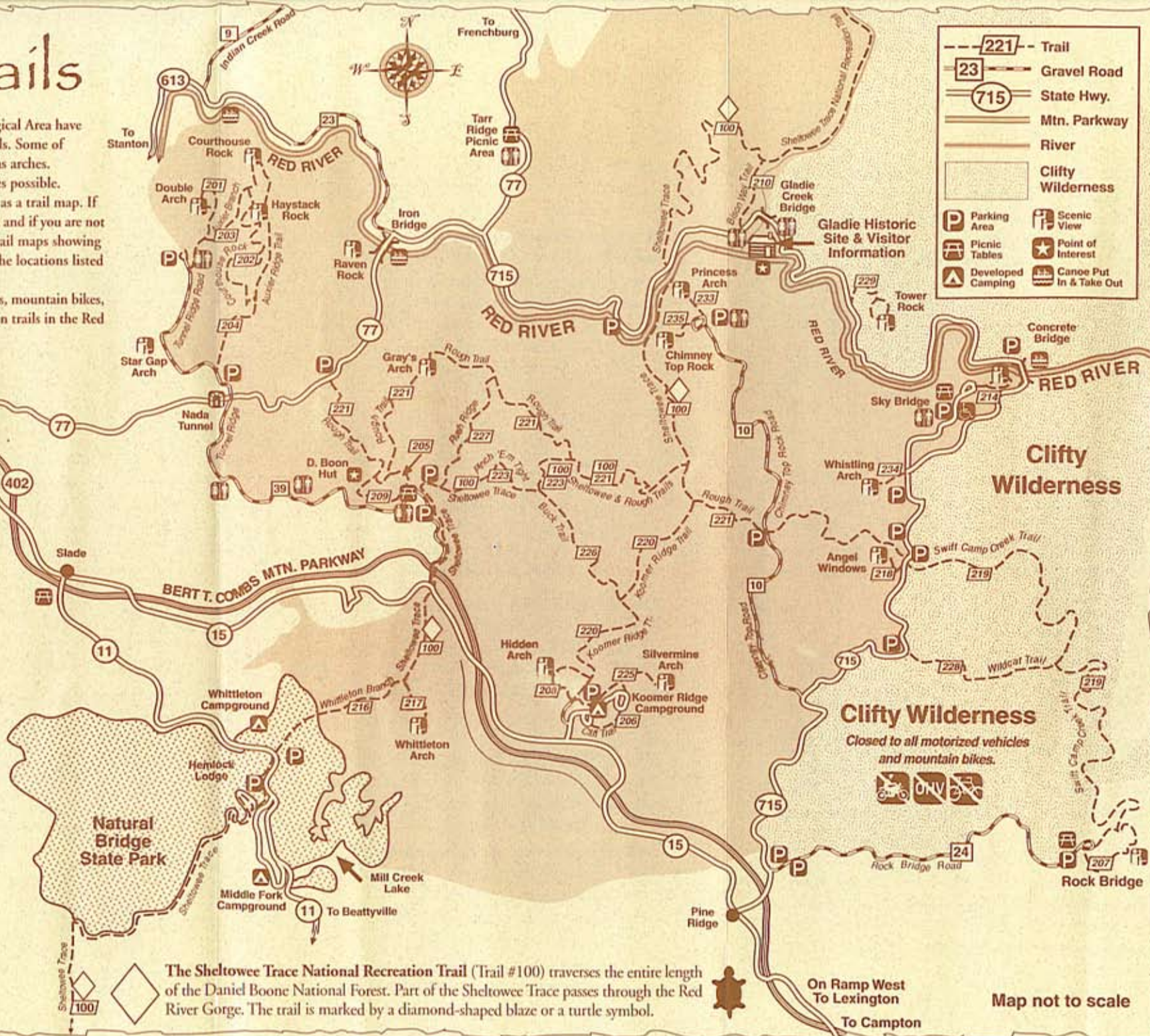
Trails within the Red River Gorge Geological Area have been designated National Recreation Trails. Some of these trails lead to specific features, such as arches. Others are connected, making longer hikes possible.

NOTE: This map is not intended for use as a trail map. If you plan on hiking any of the longer trails, and if you are not familiar with the area, we suggest using trail maps showing topography. Maps can be obtained from the locations listed on the back of this brochure.

These trails are open to hiking only. Horses, mountain bikes, and all motorized vehicles are prohibited on trails in the Red River Gorge.
